



Special Enrollment

For Native American Descendents

As a Native American descendent, you may qualify for **special enrollment**—an opportunity to renew, review, or explore new health coverage outside of open enrollment—if, in the past 60 days, you or anyone in your household:

- Lost qualifying health coverage
- Got married, divorced, or legally separated
- Had a baby, adopted a child, or placed a child for foster care
- Moved to a new ZIP code, county, or to the U.S. from a foreign country or United States territory

For additional qualifying events, talk to your Enroll Wyoming Navigator.

If you'd like, your Navigator can help you complete your application for the Health Insurance Marketplace, Wyoming Medicaid or CHIP. They can also let you know if you qualify for cost assistance to help pay for premiums and out-of-pocket expenses!



Ask

Your Navigator can answer any questions about coverage options, eligibility, cost assistance and more.

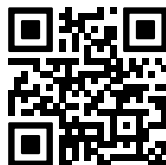


Enroll
